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Grammar Reference

Verb “to have”

The verb “to have” is used to talk about possession or relationships.

Example

I **have** a car.
He **has** two brothers.
They **have** two sisters.

Positive Form:

Subject + have/has +

Negative form:

Subject + do/does + not + have + ...

Example:

I **don't have** any brothers. (don't = do not)
She **doesn't have** a car. (doesn't = does not)

Yes/No Question:

Do/Does + subject + have + ... + ?

Example:

Do you have a sister?

Does she have a car?

Short answer:

Yes, I **do**.

No, I **don't**.

Yes, she **does**.

No, she **doesn't**.

Possessive adjectives

A possessive adjective describes the noun following it to show possession or relationships.

Example:

Is this **your** computer?
My brother is in America now.
These are **his** pencils.

Here are the possessive adjectives:

Subject Pronouns	Possessive adjectives
I	my
he	his
she	her
it	its
you	your
we	our
they	their
