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Grammar Reference

Question with the verb “do”

The word “do” or “does” as an auxiliary verb is used with a main verb when forming a question or a negative sentence in present tense.

Example:

- I don't live with my parents.
- He doesn't like to eat pizza.
- Do you want to visit the U.S.?
- Does she play football every day?

Question form:

Do/Does + subject + verb (base form) + ... + ?

Example:

- Short answer
- Do you have a TV in your bedroom?
 Yes, I do. / No, I don't.
- Does your house have a dining room? Yes, it does/ No, it doesn't.

Do/Does	subject	verb (base form)	...
Do	I/you/we/they	like	vegetables?
Does	he/she/it	drink	coffee?

Negative form:

Subject + does/do + not + verb (base form) ...

Example:

- They do not have breakfast.
- Lisa's house does not have a garden.

Subject	do/does + not (don't/doesn't)	verb (base form)	...
I/You/We/They	do not (don't)	have	breakfast on Mondays.
He/She/It	does not (doesn't)	read	books on weekends.

WH-question form:

WH-word + do/does + subject + verb (base form) + ... + ?

Example:

- Where do you live in Cambodia?
- What does he do every Sunday?

WH-word	do/does	subject	verb (base form)	... + ?
What	do	I/you/we/they	do	on Sundays?
When	does	he/she/it	want	to visit America?
