1. Perfect conditional using 'should'

The 'should' form of the perfect conditional ('should have' + past participle) may convey either of the following ideas.

a regret or reproach

Example: I should have gotten up earlier.

I wouldn't be late now.

They should have let us know. What are we going to do now?

 an (unfulfilled) expectation or assumption regarding the past

Example: You should have received my

e-mail. I sent it a half hour ago.

2. 'How' + adjective or adverb

A great deal of open questions (to which one can't answer either yes or no) are formed as follows: **how** + **adjective** or **adverb** +

verb (or auxiliary) + subject

Example:

How tall are you?

How high is Mount Everest?

How often do you go to the cinema?

<u>Note</u>. In indirect interrogatives, the verb is put after the subject: **how** + **adjective** or **adverb** + **subject** + **verb** or **auxiliary**.

Example: I wonder how far city hall is.
